




# Wild Aware - Clean Camping

**Camp Responsibly:**  
Sloppy campers and hikers don't just endanger themselves, but also future visitors.

At least 10-15' from ground and 4' from top and side supports.

100 yards

Cooking/Eating Area

- Do not leave food out which might attract bears or other animals.
- Do not leave pet food or dishes around the campsite.
- Keep pets supervised and under control.
- Wipe down picnic tables.
- Clean barbecue grills well after use.
- Pick up trash and left over food.
- Do not put trash in the fire pit and do not burn it.

**Remember: Wild animals are exciting to see and usually avoid people.**

## SHARE THE WILD

If a wild animal receives a reward from a human source it can become food conditioned. This can result in the removal or death of the animal and increase the risk of human injury. Please follow these guidelines for a safe, wild aware campsite.



**Store food and scented items in your vehicle.**



**Store food in a bear proof container.**



**Never store food or scented items in your tent.**

**Wildlife are attracted to smell —don't give them a reason to visit. Keep food and strong-smelling toiletries 100 yards away from the sleeping area. Food and trash can be hung in a tree or pole structure 10-15 feet off the ground and 4 feet from the top and side supports or tree trunk.**
